The fall wetland survey is conducted annually in mid-September, iust prior to the waterfowl hunting season to provide an assessment of conditions duck hunters can expect.

# PHEASANT, SHARPTAIL AND PARTRIDGE NUMBERS

North Dakota's roadside surveys conducted in late July and August ndicate total pheasant, sharp-tailed grouse and gray partridge numbers

State Game and Fish Department upland game biologist RJ Gross said the survey shows total pheasants observed per 100 miles are up 10% from last year. In addition, broods per 100 miles are up 17%, while the average brood size is down 5%. The decoys and marsh seats for final summary is based on 275 survey runs made along 101 brood routes across North Dakota

> "This was the first year in a while that we've had good residual cover to start the year, and good weather for nesting and brood-rearing," Gross said. "In the southwest portion of the state, which is our primary pheasant district and most popular hunting area, local popula-

Results from the southeast show birds are up 32% from last year and the number of broods up 27% Observers counted six broods and 51 birds per 100 miles. The average brood size was six.

Statistics from southwestern North Dakota indicate total pheasants were down 7% and broods observed up 2% from 2018. For every 100 survey miles, observers counted an average of six broods and 41 pheasants. The average brood size was five chicks.

The northeast district, generally containing secondary pheasant habitat with lower pheasant numbers compared to the rest of the state, showed two broods and 15 pheasants per 100 miles. Average brood size was four.

Sharptails observed per 100 miles are up 113% statewide from 2018, and partridge are up 58%.

Upland game management supervisor Jesse Kolar said sharptail numbers are still roughly 50% below 2012-15. "However, we observed slight increases in all metrics this year during our surveys especially in counties east of the Missouri River where we observed the highest numbers of grouse per 100 miles since 2013," he said.

Brood survey results show statewide increases in number of grouse and broods observed per 100 miles and in average brood size. Observ ers recorded 1.7 sharptail broods and 13.6 sharptails per 100 miles Average brood size was five.

Although partridge numbers have shown a slight increase, Gross said the majority of the partridge harvest is incidental while hunters pursue grouse or pheas ants. Partridge densities in gen eral, he said, are too low to target Observers recorded 0.5 partridge broods and 6.8 partridge per 100 miles. Average brood size was 10.

The 2019 regular pheasant season opens Oct. 12 and continues through Jan. 5, 2020. The two-day youth pheasant hunting weekend when legally licensed residents and nonresidents ages 15 and younger can hunt statewide, is set

GFP COMMISSION **ACCEPTS PETITION TO** ADJUST DOG TRAINING DAYS ON PUBLIC LANDS

The South Dakota Game, Fish and Parks (GFP) Commission accepted a citizen petition to adjust the days when dog training on horseback can occur on public lands.

Current rules only allow dog trainers to ride horses while training dogs on public lands on Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays from the first Friday of August through the first Sunday in September.

The petition requested a change from Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays to Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, citing the age of chicks in early August. The petitioner contends that disturbing young grouse or pheasants on three consecutive days could potentially break up covies, making birds more susceptible to predators.

"Grouse are an important resource to Wisconsin's outdoor enthusiasts and economy," said Mark Witecha, Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources upland wildlife ecologist. "As we enter the brood rearing season, weather conditions over the coming weeks will be critical in determining what grouse enthusiasts see in the grouse woods this fall, but increased drumming activity is a good sign that there habitat and create new habitat opwere more breeding grouse on the landscape this year."

Roadside surveys to monitor the number of breeding grouse have been conducted by staff from the department, U.S. Forest Service, tribal employees and numerous grouse enthusiasts and volunteers

The survey results showed a 41% increase statewide over 2018 levels. The central part of the state showed an increase of 35% in drumming activity, and the northern forest showed an increase of 48% in drumming activity. These two areas comprise the primary grouse range in Wisconsin. Decreases in drumming activity detected by the roadside survey occurred in the southwest part of the state (-17%) as well as the southeast (-50%), but these areas are not within the primary range for grouse. The drumming activity in southwestern and southeastern Wisconsin are at or near historic lows and likely would not signifistatewide drumming activity in- cantly add to grouse abundance in
